The Mirabal Sisters & November 25

In 1950 in Dominican Republic <u>there was</u> a dictatorship by Rafael Trujillo. The citizens <u>were</u> afraid to express their ideas until the Mirabal sisters <u>were murdered</u> by his agents. Their courage and the hideous murder catalyzed the end of Trujillo's dictatorship.

The Mirabals <u>were</u> from a wealthy family. Minerva, Patria, María Teresa and Dede <u>went</u> to a Catholic school. They <u>married</u> kind men and <u>had</u> children... In short, they <u>didn't</u> <u>have</u> the profile of revolutionary women.

Trujillo <u>used</u> his power to his own advantage. He <u>disappeared</u> people who <u>spoke</u> against his rule. He <u>sent</u> scouts to bring girls and young women to him, and he <u>raped</u> many. One day the scouts <u>sent</u> the Mirabal sisters to one of Trujillo's parties, and he <u>approached</u> Minerva Mirabal. She <u>refused</u> to have sex with him, in spite of the danger of saying no to a dictator.

Minerva was a brilliant student but as she started her second year at law school, she was banned from attending class until she gave a speech in favo(u)r of Trujillo. She graduated years later with the best grades but the government did not authorize her to work as a lawyer.

Shortly after Minerva <u>said</u> no to Trujillo, her father <u>was arrested</u>.



After a period of torture, he <u>was released</u>, and he <u>died</u>. Later, when Minerva and her mother <u>visited</u> the capitol of Santo Domingo, they <u>couldn't leave</u> the hotel. Trujillo <u>wanted</u> to have sex with Minerva before giving her freedom, but she and her mother <u>managed</u> to escape."

Trujillo <u>was</u> very angry and he <u>accused</u> Patria, Maria Teresa and their husbands of being against him.

He <u>spied</u> the family and <u>ruined</u> them and then the Mirabal family <u>decided</u> to take action. After a frustrated attempt by exiled Dominicans to kill Trujillo, the Mirabals <u>decided</u> to continue that work. They <u>distributed</u> pamphlets, <u>gathered</u> materials for weapons, and even <u>made</u> makeshift bombs with the gunpowder from firecrackers around Minerva's kitchen table. Their codename was Las Mariposas. When they <u>tried</u> to assassinate Trujillo in 1960, they <u>were imprisoned</u>. Thanks to international pressure, the women <u>were</u> quickly <u>released</u>. Trujillo designed a plan to kill them.

First their husbands <u>were transferred</u> to a remote jail. The only way to go there <u>was</u> across a mountain. The sisters <u>knew</u> that this was a trap but they <u>went</u> anyway. The secret police <u>stopped</u> their jeep in the mountain pass. The sisters <u>knew</u> they <u>were going to get killed</u>, so Patria <u>ran</u> to a nearby truck and <u>told</u> the driver who they <u>were</u>. The truck <u>left</u> quickly. The secret police <u>murdered</u> them brutally, and they <u>tried</u> to make it look like an accident.

This murder <u>catalyzed</u> the end of Trujillo. The military leaders <u>killed</u> him. One historian <u>said</u>: "the death of these women <u>had</u> a great effect on the Dominicans, in addition to other crimes."

After that, the Mirabal sisters <u>became</u> icons for the Dominican Republic. Dedé <u>did not participate</u> and <u>survived</u> Trujillo's dictatorship. She <u>raised</u> her nieces and nephews, many of whom entered the government.

All Dominican towns have a commemorative marker, school, or streets with their names. Their home province <u>was renamed</u> Hermanas Mirabal -- instead of Ciudad Trujillo.

The novelist Julia Álvarez <u>wrote</u> a historical fiction novel called In the Time of the Butterflies that <u>was adapted</u> to the cinema.

We celebrate the Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women on November 25th in their hono(u)r because this is the day they <u>were murdered</u>.
